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EASTER

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb.

~ John 20:1

And so begins the Fourth Gospel's account of Jesus' resurrection.

But the disciples' discovery of the empty tomb falls in the middle of a larger story—a series of Jesus' miraculous signs and the growing threats to his life precede it, and post-resurrection appearances to his disciples follow it.

And this, in turn, is part of an even bigger story: the narrative of God's people being chosen to be a blessing to the world. And no matter how many times those people mess up along the way—whether it be the ancient Israelites in the wilderness doubting God's provision or the present-day church in North America declining in numbers and being split apart by polarizing issues—the most amazing thing is that God remains faithful to God's people and never ceases to show them unbounded love.

This is the mystery of God's grace.

At Easter, this grace is on full display, reminding us that “God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us,” and that “neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.”

Easter reminds us also of God's power. I am thankful that the resurrection occurred in the middle of the night, when there were no people around. Because if it had happened any other way, we might try to claim for ourselves the work that God alone did on our behalf. The resurrection occurred after we, in our human weakness, had betrayed, denied, abandoned, and killed our God. And by the time we discovered that the most amazing thing in human history had occurred overnight, it was too late for us to do anything about it except believe.

So this Easter, God invites us again to re-claim our place in this story of love, grace, and power. Rather than trying to earn love and rely on our own power, we can instead be freed of this burden, receive the full acceptance of the One who is love, and rely on the power of God to overcome all our fears.

“Then the saying that is written will be fulfilled: ‘Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?’ But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.”

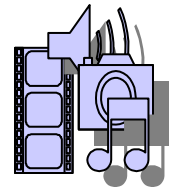

WOMEN IN THE CHURCH

Two other women's groups were very active in the life of the church over the years. The Friendship Circle and the Dorcas Class both are listed on Sunday School records as early as the late 1920's. Their membership over the years averaged between twenty and forty members. Both groups contributed generously to the needs of the church. The Friendship Circle sold various household items and held luncheons. The Dorcas Class were well known for their rummage sales, for many years under the direction of Bea Crawford. These two groups continued to meet up until the past few years. Much that we today take for granted around the church, painting, furnishings and kitchen equipment were made possible by the dedication and hard work of the women of the past.

Touch: Pressing Against the Wounds of a Broken World

Before God touched his heart and transformed his life, Rudy Rasmus was a businessman running a "borderline bordello" in Houston. But thousands now know him simply as "Pastor Rudy"—with a downtown ministry at St. John's Church that he and his wife Juanita started to reach out to those who Jesus called "the least of these." *Touch* is the amazing story of Rudy's life and ministry of grace that is changing lives daily. The church has become one of the most culturally diverse congregations in the country with people from every social and economic background, including the homeless, sharing the same pew. Pastor Rudy's message to touch the lives of those in our own communities has a lesson for us all.

The Death of the Messiah

By Raymond E. Brown

Over his illustrious career, Raymond E. Brown, S.S., Ph.D., was internationally regarded as a dean of New Testament scholars. He was Auburn Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Biblical Studies at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. He received over thirty honorary degrees from Catholic and Protestant universities worldwide, and was elected a (Corresponding) Fellow of the British Academy and a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. In addition to serving as president of the Society of Biblical Literature, the Catholic Biblical Association, and the Society of New Testament Studies, two popes appointed Father Brown as the sole American on the Pontifical Biblical Commission. Some of the best known of his more than thirty-five books on the Bible are three volumes in the "Anchor Bible" series on the Gospel and Epistles of John, as well as the Anchor Bible Reference Library volumes *The Birth of the Messiah*, *The Death of the Messiah*, and *An Introduction to the New Testament*, winner of the 1998 Catholic Press Association Award for Biblical Studies.

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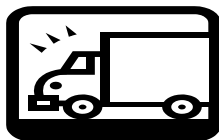
What is Angel Food Ministries? With a heart to help others and a generous spirit, Joe and Linda Wingo founded Angel Food Ministries in 1994 to provide food for friends and neighbors who were struggling financially. Today, they are still doing the same thing. The Angel Food program now is helping provide food relief to more than 50,000 families each month. Angel Food Ministries is a non-profit, non-denominational organization dedicated to providing food relief and contributing to benevolent outreaches in communities throughout the United States. There are no qualifications, minimums, income restrictions, or applications. Everyone is encouraged to participate. Orders and distributions are handled by church host sites. Orders are collected by the host sites during the first part of each month. These orders are the turned in to the Angel Food main office in Monroe, Georgia, on a predetermined date.

Several days later, in the same month, food is delivered to the host site by a pre-arranged delivery mode. The food is “restaurant grade” meats, frozen vegetables, fruits, dairy products, etc. which we acquire through our involvement with only the best producers/vendors of high quality, “name brand” foods. Never “seconds” or “day old” type products are involved. You can order as many regular units as you would like. To better help families in need, Angel Food Ministries participate in the Food Stamp Program. This program is designed to help low-income families buy the food they need for good nutrition.
