Going Green This Summer

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers."

~ Acts of the Apostles 2:42

In the church we use colors to mark time during the liturgical year. As seasons of the church calendar change and special holy days come and go, the colors used to decorate the sanctuary change as well: purple and black during Lent and Holy Week to symbolize penitence and death, white during Easter to symbolize purity and resurrection, red on the day of Pentecost to symbolize the flames of the Holy Spirit. But after Pentecost we settle into a long season of ordinary time, so called because its Sundays are counted by ordinal numbers—First Sunday after Pentecost, Second Sunday after Pentecost, etc. The liturgical color for ordinary time is green to symbolize growth.

What does it mean for us to grow as Christians? Our denominational founder, John Wesley, would often talk about the "means of grace"—that is, the channels through which God displays grace to us. Wesley encouraged us to participate in as many of the means of grace as possible, as often as possible. After all, why not let God's gifts permeate every aspect of our lives?

These means included things like holy conferencing (what we might simply refer to as talking with and leaning on our Christian friends), worshiping together, studying the scriptures with the purpose of getting closer to God, receiving the Lord's Supper (daily, if possible), and prayer.

As our Sunday summer hours begin (on June 5) and continue throughout August, we will continue to do these things together. We will continue to gather every week, study and talk together, pray for each other, celebrate the sacraments, and enjoy each other's fellowship. And all the while, the green that decorates our worship space reminds us that, as we do these things, we are participating in the same kind of spiritual growth that the earliest Christians experienced.

Sometimes that growth is rapid, like a sunflower shooting up overnight. But more often it is as imperceptible as the growth of the summer green around us. Rest assured, as we sleep and as we wake, God's kingdom continues to grow. This summer, let us join together in that growth.

WILKINSBURG COMMUNITY MINISTRY FOOD PANTRY NEWS

A new program within our existing food drive program was created in January of this year. Every month, we are asking the congregation to donate a specific food/paper item for the WCM Food Pantry. We started in January by asking for hot/cold cereal. Our goal was to collect 50 of these items and we exceeded our goal by collecting a total of 55. Our February items were canned tuna, canned chili and crackers. Our goal was to collect 60 of these items and we exceeded our goal by collecting 76. Our March item was to collect pancake and syrup. Our goal was to collect 50 and we exceeded our goal by collecting 65. Our April item was to collect 55 boxed/packaged mashed potatoes or fresh potatoes. We exceeded our goal by collecting 58. Our May item is to collect 50 pasta and pasta sauce. Please help us to reach our goal and to provide the food pantry with needed items. You may at any time, bring in any food/paper product item of your choice at any time. JUNE MONTHLY MISSION OPPORTUNITY "AUTISM SPEAKS"

Our monthly mission opportunities continue to have an impact on local organizations and those around the world. We must continue to reach out to those who are in need and to those who look for help with whatever situation they find themselves in. There are many needs and many ways to help. Our monthly mission opportunities are a way for our congregation to support different organizations and different needs. Our June Mission Opportunity will be to collect monetary donations for "Autism Speaks". "Autism Speaks" is dedicated to increasing awareness of autism spectrum disorders, to funding research into the causes, prevention and treatments.

What is Autism?

Autism is a general term used to describe a group of complex developmental brain disorders know as Pervasive Developmental Disorders (PDD). The other pervasive developmental disorders are PDD-NOD (Pervasive Developmental Disorder-Not otherwise specified), Asperger's Syndrome, Rett Syndrome and childhood Disintegrative Disorder. Many parents and professionals refer to this group as Autism Spectrum Disorders. Today, it is estimated that one in every 110 children is diagnosed with autism, making it more common than childhood cancer, juvenile diabetes and pediatric AIDS combined. Current estimates are that in the United States alone, one out of 70 boys is diagnosed with autism. An estimated 1.5 million individuals in the U.S. and tens of millions worldwide are affected by autism.

What are the most common characteristics of Autism?

Every person with autism is an individual, and like all individuals, has a unique personality and combination of characteristics. Some individuals mildly affected may exhibit only slight delays in language and greater challenges with social interactions. They may have difficulty initiating and/or maintaining a conversation. Their communication is often described as talking at others instead of to them. Children do not "outgrow" autism, but studies show that early diagnosis and intervention lead to significantly improved outcomes.

What is their mission?

Their goal is to change the future for all who struggle with autism spectrum disorders. They are dedicated to funding global biomedical research into the causes, prevention, and cure for autism and to raise public awareness about autism and its effects on individuals, families and society and to bring hope to all who deal with the hardships of this disorder. They are committed to raising the funds necessary to support these goals. "Autism Speaks" aims to bring the autism community together as one strong voice to urge the government and private sector to listen to their concerns and take action to address this urgent global health crisis. It is their firm belief that, working together, we will find the missing pieces of the puzzle. For more information about "Autism Speaks", please visit their website, www.autismspeaks.org.

JULY MISSION OPPORTUNITY BACKPACKS WITH SCHOOL SUPPLIES "THE ENVIRONMENTAL CHARTER SCHOOL AT FRICK PARK"

It is never too early to think about children going back to school. Our mission opportunity for the month of July will be to collect new backpacks and new school supplies. These backpacks and school supplies will be given to needy children at The Environmental Charter School at Frick Park. The school began with grades K-3 in 2008, fourth grade was added for the 2009/2010 year. The school will continue to grow by one grade a year to grade 8. The school is funded through taxpayer dollars and is tuition-free to the students that attend. MEN IN THE CHURCH

Women and couples were not the only groups that had active Sunday School classes...let's talk about men. Records show that in 1920 Dr. Wright taught a class with almost a hundred men on the rolls. Of course, there was a men's bible class long before that. The men had great social events. There were stag picnics either at Dr. Wright's home or at various parks out in the country. They also had combined picnics and holiday parties with the women's classes. There was a bowling league and dinner meetings. In 1931, they sponsored Troop #1 of the Boy Scouts of America and later sponsored a Cub Pack. Unknown to most, the men were also very generous helping families who were in great need. Enrollment started to decline in the late 30's and the war took it's toll in the 40's. The class finally gave way to the complete change of life that started in the 60's. An effort to have a weekly lunch meeting was tried and failed. Will Adult Sunday School made a comeback??? We will just have to wait and see.
